Outside game requests, most of the problems or questions you have should be routed to your Regional Director. Answering questions is his main function, and the sooner you inquire, the sooner things will happen for you. It is surprising how often people simply do not take the time to discover what has gone wrong, to complain about an opponent: we've set up channels to help you, so please make use of them!

The membership list enclosed with this issue is meant to allow each of us to see who lives nearby, or who might be on the path of a vacation trip. I think it is proper that we openly distribute this list among ourselves, but I think it should be emphasized that the list should not be given to any non-member. I don't know about the rest of you, but I'm on enough salesmen's mailing lists already.

Finally, my thanks to those who wrote in response to my Squad Leader request. I hope all who still needed matches have contacted Dave. For those who have not tried SL, it is a lot of fun, and very PBM-able. Jim Pratt and I, under the guise of "transferring the K", have enjoyed several games, too. Well done design.

## THE BARRAGE

We welcome two new members into the Region, who joined during April. They are Douglas A. Doug is returning to wargaming after an absence of some years, and Ben, a student at JHU, has attended a couple of our Washington-area get-togethers at Bob McLaughlin's. Welcome and good gaming, Doug and Ben!

Our most recent Southeast Region Washington-area get-together took place at Bob McLaughlin's place at Annapolis on Saturday, 21 April. Seven eager gamers were present, including, besides Bob and myself, Jim Conrady, Chris Hancock, Dan Gallagher, Ben Miller, and Joe Pelliccia. With an uneven number, we all joined in a multi-player game of "Machiavelli," Battleline's Diplomacy-type rendition of Italian Renaissance politics and warfare. Florence (Bob), France (Chris), Mantua (Ben), Venice (Joe), Naples (Dan), the Papacy (Jim), and the Turks (me), squared off in a struggle for supremacy characterized by negotiation, bribery, underhanded deals, treachery, and assassination attempts. Your correspondent had to leave before the mayhem ended about 9:30 pm. that night, just after the Turks, with most of their Mediterranean holdings overrun, managed the assassination of the Venetian Doge as a last gasp of defiance. I am reliably informed that the proceedings wound up in a standoff, with France and Venice the leading gainers. (The Venetians evidently managed to elect a new Doge.) A good time was had by all, and if you like diplomacy-type games, "Machiavelli" is one you don't want to miss. Besides plain old double-dealing, it includes such goodies as plague, famine, bribery of the other guy's counters, and other features of Renaissance life.

In spite of their enjoyability as players' games, simulations of this genre strike me as basically unrealistic and simplistic in their approach to actual power politics.

These games take no account of the long-range interests of states and too easily degenerate into mindless land-grabbing and back-stabbing. At one point, for example, Joe (Venice) wiped out my Turkish Adriatic provinces -- a perfectly logical move in the game, but it flies in the face of Venice's historic concern with its maritime trade with the Turkish - controlled Levant. Renaissance statesmen were not plaster saints, but they did not switch allegiances as easily as occurs in the average Diplomacy-type game, especially if alliances were institutionally secured by such devices as dynastic marriages. Witness the trauma when Henry VIII dumped Catharine of Aragon and broke his alliance with Spain.

Anyway, while questionable historically, "Machiavelli" and its relatives are fun to play and "Machiavelli" contributed to an enjoyable day at Bob's. Our next Washington-area gathering will be at Bob's on Saturday, 26 May. Hope to see you there.

SOME ODDS AND ENDS

- Lou Jerkich -

Issue 14-2 of the "K" contained a number of comments about honesty in PBM games, including a discussion of the merits and benefits of rolling your own dice instead of relying on ICRKS or other means. A potential problem with rolling your own die was, however, overlooked. What happens to a player's reputation for honesty when he's had a run of exceptionally good luck over a number of consecutive games? Better-than-average luck helped me win two games of Waterloo, but in my current D-Day game I'd have to say that my luck has been exceptionally good. In eleven attacks on turn ten, ranging from 1-3 to 7-1, I didn't lose a single unit. On the following turn with another eleven attacks at the same range of odds I lost only three units - two from exchanges - and one of these three was lost on a 1-2 exchange which I wanted because it destroyed one of my opponent's better units. For the most part, the rest of my attacks have had equally good results. Now, had I been rolling my own die instead of using ICRKS, and had I played all three games against the same opponent, I would not be surprised if at the very least my opponent had some doubts as to how well balanced my die was! All-in-all, I'm glad that we've been using ICRKS in these games.

Nevertheless, rolling your own die can be the most efficient method in some games and some circumstances. I've used it myself, with the variation that we had our wives roll the die and merely recorded the results.

On to other things... In the Match Request section there was a section for AREA Match Requests. Unless Avalon Hill has recently changed its policy, which I doubt, only AH games can be rated in the AREA system. However, of the 13 AREA Match Requests listed, only four were for AH games. Something is wrong here!

## FROM THE MATCH COORDINATOR

I. May I share a bit of good news and overwhelming joy with you, my daughter has informed me that come late October or early November I can expect to be a grand-parent for the first time---so if any of you out there experience a small delay during this period you will understand why. Will keep you abreast.

There was an inquiry from one of our members requesting information on the possibility of members who have teenage children and who desire to play by mail with other AHIKS member's children. This would be a great idea, but I am restricted to AHIKS membership for matching purposes and no funds can be expended for services that are not used for AHIKS. Sorry. If on the other hand members who have children who desire to play would send me their names with a SASE, I will be happy to forward you a name of those who want to be matched. By the time they reach 21 years of age AHIKS will have a good crop of experienced players for the future.

For the benefit of our newly arrived members; In the event you desire back issues of the "K" please write to our ARCHIVIST Jim Wallace, 924 Dover Rd, Westville, NJ 08093; a small fee is required. The MC or MSO does not handle published "K"s.

There has been an increase of complaints about members who have not responded to inquiries by fellow members who have been matched with them. Complaints such as: "Haven't heard from this member since"; "No reply in two months" or "Hasn't replied to my letter" etc. If at any time a member feels that he can not respond to the agreed schedule, that member should take the time to send a card of explanation, as doing so will avoid discontentment. I do not have to remind my fellow members that our Society was established to avoid this display of indifference and that the accepting, starting and completing matched sets was and still is of prime importance of the Society as a whole. So do your best to inform your opponent. (\* or face possible expulsion. jlp\*)

II ADMINISTRATION: A. There seems to be a need for clarifications on the subjects of "3-Way game" and "Multi-game"; also "Monitor" and "Game Master". I shall take a part from a letter received from John Ratzemberger which I believe will clarify the matter:

3-Way Game: A game for two players, that either due to complexity or hidden movement/limited intelligence etc, requires a third person (The Monitor) to be used. Typically, the three persons involved are rotated at the end of each game. However they need not do so.

Multi-player: A game for three or more players which Game requires the services of a GAME MASTER (GM) to be played. The function of the GM is to publish playing method and rules as needed, to publish a game report (to players or OW/PD or both), to receive moves, resolve them, and generally conduct the majority of the bookkeeping.

Any AHIKS member who desire to be matched in a Multi-player game should contact John Ratzemberger (See Call to Arms) or Larry Fong of OW/PD.

Any member who desires to game master (not monitor) a truly 2-player-type game which is to be published into the OW/PD zine should also contact John or Larry.

- b. Once a match has been made by the MC for a member from the Set Request Form that has been sent in and that match set has been completed at a later date, no new or further matches are made for that member until that member resubmits a new Set Request Form/Card or letter requesting additional matches.
- c. Many requests have I received for additional ICRK sheets for games not yet completed---When games have not been completed and one's ICRK sheet is but four (4) columns from depletion and these remaining columns will not be enough to complete the game---then that person is to request further ICRK sheets directly to the MSO (Carl Benton, 300 N. Kansas, Salina, Kansas 67401). Again, this is only if additional ICRK's are needed to complete the game that is in pro-

gress. Not for prearranged matches or new matches. These would come to me (MC).

- d. There have been several requests that have asked the MC to specify who will be playing one side or the other initially.... The MC cannot do so--- this is performed by the matched members upon receipt of the ICRK sheets and/or agreed to prior to the match.
- e. The MC has received several cards and letters wanting to know if or when a request has been filled--- It is not the policy of the MC to inform each individual when a match has been made; the members notification is the receipt of the ICRK sheet from the MSO. A delay may be experienced due to reasons beyond the control of the MSO or MC (vacation, sickness, job, etc.) or even computer breakdown. However, in the event you have not received anything within a reasonable time (let's say 3 weeks) then send me a note with full information, and I will be very willing to follow it up. May I suggest that those members who desire to limit their waiting time should request additional matches, thus limiting their need to resubmit.

## The Secretary-General

In this issue, dear reader, I will explain what I do as secretary and possibly stray into other areas. Basically, this job is the paper-shuffler's delight. I am responsible for supplying officers and others with applications for membership, information sheets, and various forms. I also send each new member our introductory booklet, which presently runs ten pages. As each form runs low I update/revise the master if necessary and hustle it to a print shop up the street. (Parenthetically, the lady who runs the shop reads all the masters and kept one of our info sheets for a cousin who games!)

Upcoming minor changes are to eliminate the term ICRK-Meister from the masters and update the "history" page. Naturally, I will appear prominently in the new version.

Please realize that I play very few titles myself and I do not play multicommander games. Thus, much of the stuff I distribute in the introductory booklet makes little sense to me. I have been in AHIKS so long that I remember the hand written ICRKS. I am, therefore, not in the best position to say that the booklet is helpful. Presently, we are considering the expansion of this booklet to make it the "once and for all" members' manual which could eliminate queries and problems of members and streamline paper work. I would appreciate any comments from members, especially new ones, on whether the present booklet is helpful, unclear, or deficient.

Now let me fly on wings of brass for a bit.

I have in the past couple years begun to wonder about this hobby. I spend a considerable amount of time gaming, I have a separate room with my PBM games on a large table locked away from kids and cats. Yet all my activity and that of thousands of others is totally ephemeral. A game such as Stalingrad, tho' I don't care for it, has developed a literature of its own. It is an intricate chess game. Yet with the discontinuation of this title, all this will inevitably vanish. My favorite game has been Waterloo, and possibly like Frank Freemon in TRC I will devote some space here to that game in future columns. In 1973, a three part article by Harley Anton appeared in "The General". It is the classic analysis of this game. Harley is a PhD in the history of this period. From meeting him, from his tournament victories, and from his other activities in the hobby I conclude he is "Mr. Waterloo". He intimates that he had the ultimate strategy for the PAA in his article. The point is this, Harley is apparently no longer active in the hobby and there are no recorded games that he has played. What is/was his PAA solution? Does this make any difference anyway? I will continue my ruminations along this line in a future column. As a minimum suggestion in line with a request in the last "K" for games to be used by "The General" for series replay, might we establish an archive as repository for all completed OB sheets?

What can the Finnish Army contribute to the Axis effort in Russian Campaign? The Finns have two major goals in 1941 (and perhaps 1942):

1. Inflict casualties, so that enemy forces needed elsewhere will be transferred to the Finnish front, and,
2. With German support, take Leningrad.

After the fall of Leningrad, the Finnish Army no longer exists as a separate entity with its own goals. The surviving Finnish units are trained to outposts throughout the Eastern Front. The Finns are prepared for winter so their forces are especially valuable during that unfriendly season to hold lonely bastions in the steppes.

As the clash of evil armies begins, the Axis attacks all along the front at odds varying from 5 to 1 up to 10 to 1, everywhere except along the Finnish front. The best attack the Finns can put together is 2 to 1, yet attack they must if they are to accomplish their goals. They can absorb one casualty for replacement next spring; even after that loss, however, they must push on.

Pull out your board now for some detailed tactics. The most common Russian defense places one defender at B9, the other at C10. The Finn usually attacks the unit on C10 at 2 to 1, hoping to kill it or to push it off the rail line so that it cannot participate in the defense to be erected opposing the main Axis thrust. The Finn could attack both Russian units, the 4-3 at 2 to 1 and the 5-3 at 1 to 1; risk a lot, maybe gain a lot. Attacking from hex B10 allows a second impulse attack if one first impulse battle is successful. I don't recommend that banzai attack, though, because a contact and an unsuccessful first impulse attack puts the Finn in an embarrassing position. I tried that suicide attack one game and watched my Finnish front collapse.

A less common Russian opening places both his defenders on D10. The Finns can now only mount a 1 to 1 attack but if this action is successful, the Finnish Army finds itself one hex from Leningrad. Even an unsuccessful attack retreats the attackers only to B11; they have crossed the river and are one hex closer in their drive for Leningrad. If the Russian opens with both defenders on C10 he has probably made a mistake. Although the Finns can only obtain a 1 to 1 attack, that attack surrounds the enemy and you have a 1 in 3 chance of destroying both Russian units.

No matter how well the opening Finnish attacks go, an attack on Leningrad probably cannot occur before September, unless HQ North can move within Stuka range on the opening blitzkrieg. Note that hex F18 is the only potential airbase within range of Leningrad which is west of Dvina.

If the Finns can establish a position on C10 by July, then they should be able to storm Leningrad with Stuka support, with or without German land Forces, in September, regardless of the weather. If General Mud has reduced your racing panzers to crawling beetles, still the Finns can mount a realistic attack. Unless Finnish losses have been grave, a 2 to 1 attack is guaranteed and a 3 to 1 is probable. But note that a contact followed by an AE just about knocks Finland out of the war.

This brings us to the other unique aspect of the Finnish front. The very existence of the Finnish Army is precarious. Though they must attack with great vigor, their thoughts must never stray too far from defense. One vicious opponent found me at the end of the opening move with Finns on B10 and A10, nowhere else. His infantry mounted a 1 to 1 on B10; an "if" move explained what would happen if this attack were successful. The two armor units he had moved to D10 would charge to B11 on the second impulse. Their attack on the A10 Finns would just about eliminate Finland, no matter its outcome. A retreat of the attacker would push a 3-5 next to Helsinki and Finland surrenders before it starts. Any other result cuts the whole Finnish Army off from supply. With quivering hands I searched out the results of the first impulse attack; luck was with me this time, but I took an oath never to take the Finns for granted again. If Finland suffers two casualties, she should probably pull back behind the A10-B11 river, which I guess represents the Mannerheim Line, realizing that Finland will be involved in a sitzkrieg until other Axis units take Leningrad.

A third goal should be considered by the Finnish commander. He may be able to break loose his fastest unit, the 3-4, for a dash along the northern edge of the map in the general direction of Archangel. Unless Leningrad falls this unit will run out of supply long before it gets there, but this feint may induce a nervous Russian to transfer forces needed elsewhere to that area. Sometimes the 3-4 can push south across the Svir River to link with German forces from Army Group North and encircle the Leningrad area.

I have devoted a whole column to the action of only four Axis units over an area of half a dozen hexes. If we consider the whole game in such detail this column will go on for 20 years.

## THE WESTERN FRONT

In my last column I mentioned that Bismark should be arriving soon and I would have some comments in this issue. At the time I did not realize that I would be reporting a major bit of ERRATA on the game. I have it official from Don Greenwood of Avalon Hill that a major mistake was made in printing up the visibility table. All modifiers should be reversed. In other words, when the table calls for you to add to the die roll you should subtract. When it shows minus you must add to the die roll. It didn't take long in playing the game to find out that once the weather went to either extreme the modifiers as shown the game turned it into a farce. In one game the weather turned poor on the third turn and never cleared enough for a search. The German player slipped out into the Atlantic and stayed there for the remainder of the game undetected. The game itself is good but not great. The intermediate game is a series of optional rules tacked on to the basic game. The basic game has very little going for it without the addition of all the options. The advanced version is well thought-out including variations in the size of the ship counters. If you have Jutland and like it you should feel right at home with Bismark.

Carl Benton and Larry Burrus and the folks up in Kansas are thinking about a get-together this summer for AHKS members in the region. With deadlines for the column having to be met in mid-May, I suggest anyone interested in this contact one of them or me for more information. As of this moment nothing has been set as to dates, etc.

In reading over the last "K" I was very pleased to see Bruce Matson's comments concerning games that are easy to PBM. In all due respect to John Ratzenberger and his views on 'roll your own' I think one of the hardest things for new members to do is to pick the games that can easily be adapted to PBM without a lot of mailings. I never cease to be amazed at the variety of games listed in 'Open Match Requests'. I admit I don't know anything about many of them, but there are others that I am familiar with and I wonder to myself how in the world they handle that by mail. Starting in the next issue of the "K" I will use this column to list games that lend themselves to a simple one-mailing-per-turn. I think I know most of the Avalon Hill games, but if any of you have a favorite game from some other publisher that you would like to see included in a PBM game list for beginners (and anyone else not interested in a lot of bookkeeping) please drop me a note. You might include a brief run-down on the mechanics of the game or any thing that may need some special handling.

I have recently been in contact with or have written to all the game publishers concerning the lack of new games that lend themselves to PBM. The only response so far has been from Don Greenwood of Avalon Hill. They are doing a new version of Battle Of The Bulge, and he indicates that one of the prime objectives in working on this new version is to keep it so that it can be adapted easily to PBM. Little or no response from the others leads me to believe they do not know that we are out here. Perhaps we all need to start a mailing campaign to let them know the type of game we would like to see more of.

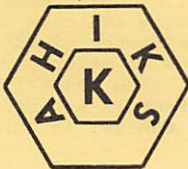
